



Arts and Crafts Research Grant: Further Particulars

The C. F. A. Voysey Society and the SAHGB are partnering to offer a grant of up to £1,000 to fund a research project on the architecture and context of the architect Charles Francis Annesley Voysey (1857-1941).

We welcome applications that explore the wider context of the Arts and Crafts in the British Isles and beyond, though preference will be given to applications that establish a clear link with Voysey.

Scope

The Arts and Crafts Research Grant may cover:

- travel
- building survey
- photography

Research grants may not cover:

- maintenance at home
- purchase of books or equipment
- secretarial help
- conference attendance

Conditions

These grants are open to application from all, including non-members.

The application must say why the research should be funded - what is new?

No-one can receive more than two grants of the same type.

Priority will be given to: applicants resident in the United Kingdom or working on the history of the architecture of the British Isles, or any part within, with preference given to applications that establish a clear link with Voysey.

Priority will be given to: postgraduate students and those within five years of completing a postgraduate degree, and also to first-time applicants.

The applicant must be intending to publish the results of his or her research or to present them at an academic conference. The grant must be acknowledged in the resulting publication or thesis.

A grant will frequently be only a contribution towards the applicant's costs and the amount applied for should be stated as part of the application; it is rare for a sum exceeding the maximum amount stated in this guidance to be granted.

All grants are made and payable in sterling.

Grants should be claimed within 3 years of being awarded, and will lapse without notice unless an extension is requested and granted.

Amount Awarded

Individual awards do not normally exceed £500, but in exceptional circumstances can be up to £1,000. Receipts are required before payment can be made.
