

# A fitting legacy

**T**HE memory of Mark Girouard (1931–2022), the architectural historian, author and former Architectural Editor of *COUNTRY LIFE*, is honoured with the creation of a new fund for publications by the Society of Architectural Historians of Great Britain.

‘The task of publishing architectural research has become ever more complicated and expensive in recent years,’ explains *COUNTRY LIFE* Architectural Editor John Goodall. ‘It seems very appropriate, therefore, that Mark Girouard—who wrote so beautifully on architecture and through his books and articles advocated the subject to such a wide public—should be celebrated posthumously by a fund that will support future scholars in bringing their work to publication.’

Girouard won the Colvin prize posthumously in 2022 for his *Biographical Dictionary of English Architecture 1540–1640* and his daughter, Blanche Girouard, has
